RED HERRINGS: VISITORS TO ARCHAEOLOGICAL SITES OFTEN TAKE FRAGMENTS OF POTTERY AWAY WITH THEM, OBTAINED EITHER BY PURCHASE FROM THE SITE MUSEUM OR BY WALKING OVER ROMAN TOWN SITES NOW UNDER THE PLOUGH.

INTERESTING COLLECTIONS OF POTTERY CAN BE FORMED IN THIS WAY; SEVERAL OF OUR JUNIOR MEMBERS HAVE GATHERED POTTERY ON THEIR VISITS AND BY DRAWING AND DATING THEIR SHERDS HAS ENABLED THEM TO GAIN A GREATER UNDERSTANDING OF THE SUBJECT.

IT IS THE POTTERY WHICH IS NOT RETAINED THAT CAN CAUSE CONFUSION: THROWN OUT, OFTEN IN THE GARDEN, WHERE IT REMAINS TO BE "DISCOVERED" BY SOME ENTHUSIASTIC AMATEUR ARCHAEOLOGIST. THERE ARE AT LEAST TWO NOTES IN THE SOCIETY'S RECORDS REGARDING ROMAN POTTERY FOUND IN THIS AREA UNDER CIRCUMSTANCES WHICH AROUSE SUSPICIONS AS TO ITS TRUE ORIGIN.

AN ILLUSTRATION OF THE DANGERS OF DISCARDED POTTERY IS CONTAINED IN AN ARTICLE IN THE MARCH ISSUE OF "ANTIQUITY": POTTERY FOUND UNDER A TENNIS COURT IN STANMORE AND AT FIRST THOUGHT TO BE SAXON WAS LATER IDENTIFIED AS COMING FROM JEBEL MOYA IN THE SUDAN. THE SHERDS HAD BEEN REJECTED WHEN THE POTTERY FROM THE WELLCOME EXCAVATIONS WAS SORTED AND THE REJECTS USED AS A FOUNDATION FOR THE COURT.

WHAT SHOULD BE DONE WITH UNWANTED POTTERY? ONE CAN OF COURSE POUND IT INTO INIDENTIFIABLE DUST, BUT THE EASIEST AND SAFEST METHOD, AS SUGGESTED IN "ANTIQUITY", IS TO USE THE DUSTBIN WHERE IT WILL AT LEAST BE STRATIFIED WITH MODERN RUBBISH ON THE MUNICIPAL TIP.

HE IS AT PRESENT, AMONGST OTHER ACTIVITIES, ENGAGED ON PREPARING THE ARCHAEOLOGICAL SECTION OF THE LONG AWAITED VOLUME ONE OF THE VICTORIA COUNTY HISTORY OF MIDDLESEX.

WEDNESDAY, 30TH AUGUST: MR. G. GILLAM WILL DESCRIBE WITH THE AID OF SLIDES LAST YEAR'S EXCAVATIONS ON THE ROMAN ROADS AROUND BRAUGHING IN HERTFORDSHIRE. THESE EXCAVATIONS, UNDER THE DIRECTION OF MR. W. BARR AND MR. GILLAM, RAISED MANY NEW PROBLEMS, BUT ONE MAJOR CONTRIBUTION WAS THE LOCATION OF THE TRUE COURSE AND NATURE OF ERMINE STREET BETWEEN PUCKERIDGE AND BRAUGHING.

FIELD STUDIES COUNCIL: A COURSE IN FIELD ARCHAEOLOGY WILL BE HELD BY THE FIELD STUDIES COUNCIL FROM WEDNESDAY, 23rd August, to Wednesday, 6th September, 1961, at the Flatford MILL FIELD CENTRE NEAR COLCHESTER. THE COURSE IS DESIGNED TO ACQUAINT STUDENTS WITH THE MANY FACETS OF ARCHAEOLOGICAL FIELD WORK AND IN PARTICULAR TO INSTRUCT AND GIVE THEM PRACTICE IN EXCAVATION AND ITS ASSOCIATED RESEARCHES.

STUDENTS WILL RECEIVE INSTRUCTION AND DEMONSTRATION IN METHODS AND TECHNIQUES. THEY WILL PARTAKE IN ALL STAGES OF AN EXCAVATION, FROM THE INITIAL MARKING OUT OF THE AREA TO BE INVESTIGATED, TO THE FINAL PREPARATION OF THE REPORT FOR PUBLICATION. THE EXCAVATION WILL TAKE PLACE ON A ROMAN SITE IN THE NEIGHBOURHOOD OF COLCHESTER.

The fee will be  $\pounds16$  for the two weeks. Students and staff from universities which directly grant-aid the F.S.C. will pay  $\pounds13$ .
